Focus on mission @ Central

At Central Church in Torquay we have spent some months looking at our way forward and we are bringing in some new ways of helping us focus on our core purpose. Our mission statement, which we have had for some years, says that our mission is:

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- To nurture all believers, whether new or longstanding.
- To respond to human need by loving service.
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society.
- To sustain and renew the life of the earth.

This is all well and good, but how do we make all these things a reality rather than an aspiration? This is a question we have been asking ourselves!

As part of answering that question, one thing we have decided to do is spend time as a church community focusing on each of those five mission elements: from September, we will take each aspect of our mission as our theme for the church for two months.

In September and October, we will be asking ourselves questions about what we mean and what our role is when we say we are here to 'sustain and renew the life of the earth'. Some of our services will pick up this theme, and our house groups and study groups will also be looking at the issue using a study guide called Hope in God's future: Christian discipleship in the context of climate change.



We intend to go beyond thinking about this issue - and, in turn, about the other parts of our mission - and to ask ourselves not just what we can do, but we what we intend to do.

As part of this project we are also starting a monthly 'Café Church' in our evening service. This is going to be a time when we can focus on our theme in a more informal way, using conversation and reflection as a way of drawing new people into our conversations about mission. Our first café service is on Sunday 17th September, and we have invited David Curry from the Christian ecology organisation A Rocha UK to speak to us. We are publicising this widely, and we hope this will be of interest to people who are concerned about these issues, even if they are not enthusiastic about traditional church services. We warmly invite you to join us if you would like to, and to help us spread the word!

Café Church will be happening in the evening on the third Sunday of each month as part of our pragmatic and hopeful focus on

We have also recently completed the Mission Shaped Introduction course. Jo Simpson, the District Evangelism Enabler, led about fifteen of us through a process of thinking differently about mission, and helped us to generate some real enthusiasm for this dimension of Church. We enjoyed the experience, as well as being challenged by it, and we are now hoping to grow some new initiatives engaging with the elderly and isolated in the communities around us. Watch this space!

"Many parts form one body" (1 Cor. 12:12)

Stand by me

When I was a teenager, I used to despair that older people would think a pop song that was more than five years old was somehow 'cutting edge' and relevant for conversation with young people. Now I often find myself doing the same, with the excuse that in my teens there was really no such thing as the 'pop classic' but there certainly is now.

In 1999 BMI (Broadcast Music Incorporated) announced the Top 100 Songs of the Century, listing the most played songs on American radio and television. At number 4 was 'Stand by me', a song that had attained more than 7 million airplays and been performed, among others, by Ben E. King and John Lennon. But what a lot of people don't know is that the second verse is inspired by Psalm 46 (verse 2).

> If the sky that we look upon Should tumble and fall Or the mountain should crumble to the sea I won't cry, I won't cry No, I won't shed a tear Just as long as you stand Stand by me.



Psalm 46 has inspired generations of people, probably none more so than Martin Luther, whose writings, particularly his 95 Theses which he nailed to door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg (the church door serving rather in the same way that a public notice

board would today), and which triggered the Reformation. The world of 16th century Europe was significantly different from the modern world of 21st century Britain but some important questions remain the same:

Is there a God?

How can we know God?

How can we be right with God?

About 50 years before Martin Luther, the development of the printing press had made it far easier for books and papers to be widely publicised. It had also enabled the much wider distribution of the Bible.

The Bible addresses the three important questions above. I don't expect it comes as a great surprise that the Bible teaches that there is a God. However, it also says that he can be known not just indirectly through creation but personally. God has not simply made himself known through prophets, at many times and in various ways, but has supremely made himself known through his Son, Jesus Christ. It is through Jesus Christ that we can be made right with God.

By reading the Bible, Martin Luther discovered that believers are made right with God by faith in Jesus Christ, the Son of God who loved us and died for us. It is in a personal relationship of trust that we believe that whatever happens, he stands by us - 'A safe stronghold our God is still'.

The 500th anniversary of the 95 Theses and the start of the Reformation will be celebrated on 31st October 2017.

Greetings from our Korean friends

In the first edition of *Connected*, we included greetings from two of the Korean students who shared in worship with us at Palace Avenue and Goodrington Methodist Churches while they were at a language school in Paignton last year. Jaewon (Joanna) and Min-yung (Sophia) were both in touch in July to tell us about what they've been doing since then.

Jaewon writes:



'Hello! I'm so happy to say hi to you again! I'm still in London, and just finished exams. I've got a conditional offer from King's College, but the condition is too high for me. But the thing is I did my best and do not regret the time even [though] I feel I

cannot reach the conditional score and cannot enter the university in the UK. My visa expires on 30th August so I'm preparing to go back to Korea.

'After the exams, in fact during the whole period, I struggled. I went to the Courtauld gallery and met this painting, *Ecce Homo* by Anthony van Dyck, which has so sad eyes of Jesus avoiding my gaze. The eyes said something like, "I'm giving you the best things every time, but are you following my way, the cross?"



'I know my Lord is leading me the best way and what I have to do is just follow that way. But sometimes it's hard to

follow, as you know. Now I feel better about my situation, but I still have anxiety for my near future.

'I went to a Korean church, God's Vision Church in Oxford Circus, which is the biggest Korean church in the UK, [and then] moved to another Korean Church near Russel Square. Those are quite nice because of the Korean style service with Koreans. I could feel I am not alone, and made many Korean friends who can talk about Jesus.'

Min-yung writes:

'Hello. How are you? It's already been a year! Time goes by so fast. I really miss you. When I was in Paignton, it was the happiest [time] in my life.



'I decided to teach Korean language abroad. An institute accepted me in November 2016. I wanted to go to UK or

UAE, however they sent me to Tajikistan. Actually, I think God sent me here. I trust him because he always has the best plan for me.

'So I'm in Tajikistan now. I've been here for 3 months. I'll stay here until end of this year. I'm teaching the students of Tajik language university. I really love my job. My major in university was Russian literature and language so I knew about Tajik but not very much. Islam is the state religion. There is no church in Tajikistan [so] I worship alone in my room every Wednesday, Friday, Sunday.

'Please pray for me! And I will pray for you!'

For six Sundays in July and August at Palace Avenue, successive preachers took up the challenge of preaching on a specific parable of Jesus, and six windows were decorated to depict the parables chosen.

We had some very good, thought-provoking sermons, which were well received by the congregation.

The scones, jam and cream were thoroughly enjoyed by those who came, and we hope the prayer stations were appreciated as much as the teas!
